Except for francophones, all students who are registering in a French course at UNB, for the first time, must take the French Placement Test before registering for a course. The Placement Test (2 parts) takes about 40 minutes and is done on the computers in the French Multimedia Laboratory, Singer Hall 156. Students must then present their test results to the French Department Office, Tilley 231, where they will be sent to one of our advisors for verification of their current level of French and course approval.
