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Patient partner spotlight:



Betty is one of CRIC's hardworking patient partners and we are so lucky to have her on our team! We asked Betty to share her journey as a patient partner:

In February of 2019, my husband and I were invited to participate in the Comprehensive Assessment of Neurodegeneration and Dementia (COMPASS-ND) Study. Since Alzheimer's Disease is prevalent on both sides of my family, I did not hesitate. Our participation in that study, made us aware of various other studies in which we took part! In May of 2019, I submitted my name to the Horizon Health Network Research Department to allow them to contact me for any relevant projects in which I might be interested in participating. A couple of years later, I was invited to participate in research planning sessions, which focused on the best way to recruit participants for research projects.

In August 2022, I was recruited as a patient partner at CRIC for the Better understanding care transitions of adults with complex health and social care needs project. Part of the study branched off to another project called Emergency Department (ED) Avoidance Study. One of my roles in both projects was to complete survey questions with a researcher and I made edits and suggestions before the surveys were provided to research participants. Both of those projects are still active and I attend meetings and updates. In March of 2024, I was invited to be involved in the Strategy for Patient Oriented Research (SPOR) REFRESH: New Brunswick, which is ongoing.

Since July 2024, I have been a member of the planning committee for the 2025 Canadian Healthcare Navigation Conference (CHNC). It is my first time being involved in the planning of a conference and I am finding it very interesting and relevant to see some of the research project topics for past conferences and this one. To help with my continued involvement as a patient partner. I was asked to participate in an MSSU Patient-Oriented Training Practicum which involved 4 online modules and a multi-disciplinary attendance session. It was very informative and helped me become more confident in my patient partner role.

Project spotlight: Better understanding care transitions of adults with complex health and social care needs

People with chronic conditions and complex care needs often require services from providers across different sectors, including health and social care settings. This can lead to various points of transition in care where patients move from various health and social care settings (e.g. between primary care, hospital, community, and home settings). These transitions can be challenging to navigate. The study "Better understanding care transitions of adults with complex health and social care needs" seeks to better understand the factors that contribute to both positive and negative transition experiences.

This project is funded by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research and is led out of the University of Sherbrooke, under the leadership of <u>Dr. Catherine Hudon</u> and <u>Shelley Doucet</u>. The project is taking place in Quebec and New Brunswick.

The main focus of the study is on the transitions experience of individuals with complex care needs, but we will also be looking at the experiences of health professionals, community partners, and health managers.

We hope that this study will help fill a knowledge gap around experiences throughout the transitions journey, including how individual and environmental factors are associated with good or bad experiences of care transitions.

Dr. Barbara Pesut, PhD, RN

Dr. Barbara Pesut is a Professor in the School of Nursing at the University of British Columbia Okanagan and holds a Principal Research Chair in Palliative and End of Life Care. Dr. Pesut has developed a volunteer navigation intervention called Nav-CARE (Navigation: Connecting, Advocating, Resourcing, Engaging) that uses specially trained and mentored volunteers to provide navigation support for those living at home with declining health. After a decade of building evidence around Nav-CARE, it has now been scaled out to sites across Canada and is being adapted, implemented, and evaluated in six European countries.
