# <u>Project Spotlight: Better understanding care transitions for adults with</u> <a href="mailto:complex health and social care needs">complex health and social care needs</a>

CRIC is part of a interprovincial study, led out of the University of Sherbrooke, aimed at better understanding transitions in healthcare for adults with chronic conditions and complex care needs. These individuals often require services from multiple providers across various sectors, including health and social care settings, which can be challenging to navigate. This mixed methods study aims to fill the knowledge gap around patients' experiences with transitions and the factors that contribute to positive and negative experiences.

This study takes place in emergency departments of participating provinces, which include New Brunswick, Newfoundland and Labrador, and Quebec. Information is gathered on patients' experiences, along with the perspectives of health professionals, community partners, health managers and family care partners. CRIC has two full-time research assistants dedicated to this project. Laura Dickinson is collaborating with providers out of the Saint John Regional Hospital's Emergency Department while Emilie Georgoudis works out of St. Joseph's Hospital's urgent care centre. We are excited to be part of this study that seeks to gain insight into healthcare transitions for adults with chronic conditions and complex care needs.
