Project Spotlight:

Navigating Dementia NB/Naviguer la démence NB is a research project piloting patient navigation for individuals living with dementia, their care partners, and members of the care team, co-led by Dr. Shelley Doucet and Dr. Alison Luke at the Centre for Research in Integrated Care (University of New Brunswick), and Dr. Pamela Jarrett with Horizon Health Network and Dalhousie Medicine NB. This project is funded by a Healthy Seniors Pilot Project grant, through the Public Health Agency of Canada and the Government of New Brunswick. The main goals of this project are to: (1) increase knowledge of, and access to, services and resources; and (2) to improve experiences with health and social care systems for individuals living with dementia, their care partners, and their care team by improving the integration and coordination of care. To achieve these goals, our team developed and implemented a patient navigation program for individuals living with dementia, their care partners, and members of the care team. Six patient navigators (4 anglophone and 2 francophone) were embedded in primary care clinics/ health centres in urban and rural settings across New Brunswick. This patient navigation program was piloted for 12 months (July 2022-July 2023). Over the one year pilot, 156 participants (people living with dementia and their care partners) took part in the program across NB. A mixed methods evaluation of this program is underway, and preliminary results suggest that patient navigation is beneficial for individuals living with dementia and their care partners in New Brunswick.

Good News

Better Understanding Care Transitions of Adults with Complex Health and Social Care Needs: An Essential Step Towards Integrated Care.

Over the past year, CRIC has been involved in a study titled "Better Understanding Care Transitions of Adults with Complex Health and Social Care Needs: An Essential Step Towards Integrated Care," funded by the Canadian Institutes for Health Research and led out of the University of Sherbrooke. CRIC is leading the New Brunswick

portion of this project. The main goals of this study are to understand transitions for adults with complex health and social care needs and to understand what factors contribute to good and bad transition experiences. We have been recruiting participants for the Transitions project at St. Joseph's Urgent Care Department, as well as the Emergency Department at the Saint John Regional Hospital. We are happy to report that through the efforts of our research assistants, Laura Dickinson, and Emilie Georgoudis, 122 out of our total goal of 150 have been recruited to participate in the study.
