

Director's Report

To begin, I would like to express my gratitude to the staff of the MMFC, the MMFC Board, the Fergusson Foundation, and Dean of Arts Peter Thompson for inviting me to assume this role again. I particularly want to thank Associate Director Danie Gagnon, Michael Van-Tassell, Peter Titus, and Ashley Morehouse. Without their dedication, flexibility, and earnest commitment to collaboration day after day, our accomplishments this year would not have been possible.

The spirit of their dedication was evident throughout the year and was particularly visible during the organization of the campus visit and keynote address by longtime CBC journalist and host Anna-Maria Tremonti. In 2022, Tremonti shared her own experience with gender-based violence and intimate partner violence through her podcast, "Welcome to Paradise," with the hope of helping other survivors feel less isolated. On December 6, she shared her experience with us during the University of New Brunswick's National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women. This important event, organized by UNB Diversity Within Engineering, highlighted a powerful collaboration involving Engineering student leaders, MMFC, the Fergusson Foundation, the UNB Faculty of Arts, the Government of New Brunswick's Women's Equality Branch, and the UNB Office of the President. Together, we honoured the memory of the 14 women murdered during the Montréal Massacre at École Polytechnique in 1989. I, along with many attendees, was profoundly inspired by Tremonti's reminder that the shame associated with intimate partner violence is not a burden survivors should carry alone. Addressing gender-based violence is a collective responsibility. This event sparked significant collaborative momentum that promises continued impact for years ahead.

I also wish to thank former Director Dr. Cathy Holtman for her dedicated years of service to the MMFC and her unwavering commitment to addressing gender-based and intimate partner violence. Dr. Holtman's steady leadership, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic, has been invaluable. Her oversight of significant research and collaborations has positioned the MMFC strongly for ongoing success. Additionally, I warmly welcome Dr. Stefanie Hunt-Kennedy as the new Director of the MMFC. I am both excited and inspired by Dr. Hunt-Kennedy's research and the direction she will guide the MMFC in the coming years.

Looking ahead, I am eager to continue collaborating with the MMFC team, the Fergusson Foundation, and the robust community of researchers connected to the MMFC. As I step out of this role, I am confident in the strong, collaborative, and meaningful work that lies ahead. I am so glad to have been able to reciprocate all the support that the MMFC has provided for me over the years, and I am so happy to have served the centre again during this year of transition, collaboration, and growth.

Administrative Update

MMFC staffing changes

- Michael Van Tassell was hired as temporary Administrative Coordinator in May 2024 and hired in a permanent position in February 2025.
- Dr. Matt Roger was appointed to Acting Director from August 2024 to June 2025.
- Danie Gagnon was hired as permanent Associate Director in September 2025, after serving in the role on an interim basis starting March 2024.
- Two Work Study students joined the MMFC in 2024–2025:
- Linh Nguyen supported marketing and communications in Fall 2024
- Marie-Laure Alorvor served as Data Management Assistant in Winter 2025, contributing to the development of the MMFC's Data Management Strategy.
- Ashley Morehouse joined in January 2025 as Knowledge Dissemination Officer, contributing significantly to podcast production alongside Peter Titus.
- Following a hiring process, Dr. Stefanie Hunt-Kennedy was hired as Director and will begin a four-year term on July 1st, 2025.

Over the past year, the MMFC staff focused their efforts on achieving the strategic goals as set out in the Strategic Plan 2023-2028

Administrative Processes

- The MMFC staff has transitioned the majority of its operations to the Microsoft Teams environment, leveraging existing software and tools provided by UNB to enable seamless and effective collaboration.
- A series of guideline documents outlining key administrative processes—such as document retention and organization, project management, and communications—were developed to support this period of transition and ensure consistency in the Centre's operations.

Education Programs

- The MMFC staff promoted the Certificate in Family Violence Issues (C-FVI) through inclass presentations, posters, and Welcome Week Materials.
- In Collaboration with the Office of the Vice-Provost Academic Administration,we developed a program modification proposal to adapt the C-FVI to new audiences across Canada.
- Due to its limited alignment with Family and Gender-Based Violence research, and its lack of revenue-generating potential, the MMFC's partnership with Griffith University to offer the *Essential Skills for Interviewing Children* online education program has not been renewed.

Administrative Update

Events

- As part of UNB's Research Week, the MMFC hosted an Open House on October 9th, 2025. The event gathered stakeholders of the MMFC.
- In November, the MMFC hosted two webinars for Family Violence Prevention Month. On November 7th, Dr. Kelly Scott-Storey presented on the iHeal app, which supports the health and safety of women experiencing intimate partner violence (IPV). On November 21st, Dr. Alexa Yakubovich discussed systems responses to violence against women. Both webinars are available on the MMFC YouTube channel.
- On December 6, 2024, the MMFC co-hosted a National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women event alongside the UNB Diversity Within Engineering student group.

Renowned journalist Anna Maria Tremonti delivered the keynote address, commemorating the victims of the 1989 École Polytechnique Massacre.

We wish to recognize the contributions of the Fergusson Foundation, UNB office of the President, UNB Faculty of Arts, and the GNB Women's Equality Branch for their support in making this event a success!



Episode 2, featuring Kathleen Allen, and hosted by Ph.D. candidate Katie Hamill, will be releasing this Fall.



Education

Certificate in Family Violence Issues (C-FVI)

The Muriel McQueen Fergusson Centre (MMFC) continues to offer the Certificate in Family Violence Issues (C-FVI) in partnership with the Faculty of Arts, providing students with an opportunity to earn an interdisciplinary micro-credential focused on the study of family violence.

Registrations:

In the 2024–25 academic year, the C-FVI welcomed 21 new students, with 10 students completing the program in May 2025. As of April 2025, 29 students were actively enrolled.

New curriculum additions:

GWS 3003 – Feminist & Queer Theories (Intensive)

HIST 3131 – Gender and Sexuality in Early Modern Europe (Supplementary)

HIST 3801 – Gender and War (Supplementary)

PSYC 3333 – The Psychology of Addiction (Supplementary)

A full description of the C-FVI and a complete list of eligible courses is available in the undergraduate calendar.

New program delivery:

Over the past year, significant effort was dedicated to preparing a modified program proposal for submission to the Maritime Provinces Higher Education Commission (MPHEC). The proposed updates reflect key enhancements to the C-FVI, including expanded online offerings and greater flexibility in course delivery. With an increasing number of Core and Supplementary courses now available online, students can complete the certificate entirely through self-paced online learning. This flexibility has improved accessibility, particularly for those unable to attend in-person classes.

We concluded this project in March 2025, which will include a knowledge mobilization event in St. John's, NL this summer where we will share and action the findings of this project for IPV risk assessment and police response to IPV.



Achievements:

I work collaboratively with police organization, the NB Department of Justice and Public Safety, and John Howard Society of New Brunswick on diverse research and consulting projects. In the context of Family Violence research, I have provided training to probation officers and victim services professionals for the NB Department of Justice and Public Safety earlier this year on the dynamics of IPV, its risk factors, and intervention services for perpetrators of violence to reduce IPV behaviour, as well as the importance of safety planning and risk mitigation for the safety of the survivor of this violence (see below for workshop titles).

We will be using the data obtained from the CELIA research project on the ODARA and police response to IPV in the coming year to advise the policing sector on training needs for improving police response to IPV. In collaboration with Inspector Mike Young with the Saint John Police Force, we have developed a Research Advisory Committee within the structure of the NB Association of Chiefs of Police to provide a direct conduit for knowledge dissemination and mobilization, as well as research development, within the policing sector on diverse criminal justice topics, including IPV and Family Violence more broadly in New Brunswick.

The A2A is developing a web-based family violence assessment guide for use by family law practitioners and service providers across Canada. A one-day workshop was hosted at UNB in December 2024 to train frontline family law practitioners in the use of the draft assessment tool to beta-test.

Regional CoP (communities of practice) meetings occurred in January 2024, Jun 2024, September 2024, and January 2025. The CoP members include a variety of legal practitioners and gender-based violence community support services throughout Atlantic Canada.

A webinar was hosted on the topic of policing coercive control (June 5, 2024).

A research brief on cultural minorities and family law was produced and disseminated via the A2A website in February 2025.

The next fiscal year will be a subsequent webinar on the topic of aging populations and IPV/homicide, as well as the publication of legal bulletins regarding notable court case decisions in Atlantic Canada.



Department of Justice – Restorative Justice & Courtroom Experience Video Projects

The Department of Justice – Restorative Justice & Courtroom Experience projects entail the production of immersive 360-degree video educational resources to build knowledge of trauma-informed justice services and processes. This style of media has the potential to generate a powerful and dynamic sense of immersion, allowing viewers to interact with the environment and gain a better understanding of the geography of a space. It also provides the audience with the agency to choose which visual information to access, and when to access it. In collaboration with the New Brunswick Department of Justice and Public Safety, the team is working on two projects, Restorative Justice and Courtroom Experiences, respectively.

Both projects provide accessible digital media in both French and English.

Our collaborations with the Restorative Justice team at the Government of New Brunswick has continued this, with the creation of 3 new video projects which have now been completed. This videos were created as apart of an ongoing effort to inform the public of the benefits of restorative justice. Our team created a bilingual testimonial video where various professionals in the Restorative Justice field were interviewed about what restorative justice meant and what it could look like.

The second video features commissioned watercolours with a narrator explaining what restorative justice was and its benefits on the community. Both french and english versions of this video have been completed.

The Courtroom Experience project was a part of a bigger initiative focused on Trauma Informed Justice Practices in New Brunswick. The approach was to create 360-degree immersive videos to educate audiences about the court houses virtually, before they physically arrive at the space. The goal is that, by providing the public with a guided virtual tour of the space, it will help to reduce the fear and anxiety of individuals who will be entering the facility. Through narration, text cues, and additional information, viewers will be able to gain a better understanding of the court, its functions, and its processes. The Court of Kings bench and the Provincial Court were the two courts scanned in Moncton. The team hopes that providing this immersive learning experience for victims, prior to arriving at the court for the first time, can mitigate intimidation, anxiety, and stress. This project will be completed and used for training exercises starting later this fall.

The research team, overseen by Dr. Matt Rogers, is engaging in theoretical and methodological analysis of these projects, tracking their implications from their envisioning to their distribution. With the near completion of these initial projects, the team is now developing various new educational resources in the same vein as these projects.

Program implementation

The AIM Program is a virtual intervention that consists of two components, a one-hour information-sharing component, and a social support component, which is delivered over 12-weekly sessions (20 minutes per session). The program implementation stage is now complete. During this reporting period, we had four trained program facilitators deliver the AIM Program to participants in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island. 27 of the 31 (87%) participants randomized to receive the intervention completed the intervention. 11 were from Nova Scotia, 13 were from Nova Scotia, and 3 were from Prince Edward Island.

Community Engagement Activities
During the recruitment phase of this reporting
period (April – July 2024) there was ongoing collaboration with the 15 organizations that partnered
with us to spread awareness of the study within
their networks and to attempt to recruit potentially
eligible participants.

A total of 53 women enrolled in the study, 24 of these participants were recruited via our community partnerships.

Quantitative data collection

Six survey instruments were collected with each participant at 3 time points, baseline, 3-months post intervention, and 9-months post intervention. These surveys were conducted by telephone and measured the following outcomes: knowledge about IPV, use of safety strategies, and physical and mental health outcomes. Baseline data collection is now complete, with 53 participants having completed a baseline interview. 3-month follow-up data is now complete, with 42 participants having completed a 3-month follow-up interview (79% completion rate). 9-month follow-up data has been collected with 17 participants and is ongoing.

Qualitative data collection

We explored the experiences of the facilitators who implemented the AIM program and the trial participants who took part in the AIM program through qualitative methods. Qualitative interviews were conducted with 3 AIM program facilitators and 20 intervention group participants. A reflexive thematic analysis was conducted, and the analysis is now complete. Manuscripts and presentations are currently being prepared to disseminate the findings.

Knowledge Mobilization

Our team has been engaging in several knowledge mobilization activities, many of which are outlined in the following section.

We published the study protocol in an open access journal (https://www.researchprotocols.org/2024/1/e57886)

We participated in a global webinar in June 2024 through the JBI Centre for Excellence at Dalhousie University.

We presented preliminary findings at the MMFC AGM in September 2024.

We presented preliminary findings at two academic conferences in October 2024.

Anna-Lee Straatman (project manager) and Jessica Webb (implementation coordinator) from the Knowledge Hub at the Centre for Research and Education on Violence against women and children visited the MMFC to have in-person meeting with the core team in November 2024 to discuss our study progress and implementation plans.

We have submitted abstracts to present at several conferences that will be taking place throughout the next fiscal year.

The Muslim Family Safety Project is a collaborative partnership which began in 2019 between the Religion and Violence Research Team of the MMFC, the Arabic Cultural Centre (ACC), and the Muslim Resource Centre for Social Support and Integration (MRCSSI) in London, Ontario. The Project's Advisory Committee includes representatives from the Fredericton Police Force, Liberty Lane Domestic Violence Outreach, and the GNB Department of Social Development. The project aim is to build bridges of understanding between Muslim and Arab families and providers of public family violence services in the Fredericton area.

Members of the ACC and Cathy Holtmann worked closely with Eugene Tremblay and Abir Al Jamal of the MRCSSI to continue to support Muslim and Arab families whose children are in the care of GNB's Child Protection services. The new Child and Youth Well-Being Act specifies that child protection services will include consideration of kin, culture, ethnicity, heritage, traditions and spiritual beliefs. It promotes collaborative approaches to engage with family and other persons who have connection to children and youth and prioritizes their placement in the care of people who share their language, culture heritage or religion.

The ACC drafted a Letter of Agreement with the Department of Social Development's Child Protection Unit that formalizes their partnership in providing culturally integrative support to Muslim and Arab families whose children and youth are under protection of the Minister. The Letter has been accepted in principle by SD but has not yet been signed.

With funding from the Fredericton Community Foundation, members of the Muslim Family Safety Project team participated in a training workshop delivered by Dr. Mohammed Baobaid, former Executive Director of the MRCSSI, on February 22-23, 2025. The workshop included an organizational capacity assessment exercise for members of the ACC and training in a Culturally Integrative Family System Response, including the use of the Four Aspects Screening Tool (FAST).

The Muslim Family Safety Project team met on Saturday 12 April and developed an activity plan for the next year.

During the reporting period our main interaction with community -based organizations consisted in regular newsletter production and distribution (roughly once a month over the winter months and once every two months the remaining time); through "policy briefs" based on our mainstream academic publications; through social media (X and Blue Sky) updates; and through updates of our website.

Research fellows

Dr. Alexa Yakubovich is an Assistant Professor in Community Health and Epidemiology at Dalhousie University (cross-appointed in Gender and Women's Studies) and Affiliate Scientist with Nova Scotia Health. Dr. Yakubovich's mixed-methods research program includes investigations of the social and structural determinants of violence against women and the design and evaluation of interventions that account for these determinants. She received her PhD in Evidence-Based Social Intervention from the University of Oxford as a Rhodes Scholar and completed her postdoctoral fellowship, funded by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR), at the University of Toronto and St. Michael's Hospital, where she remains in Affiliate Scientist.

Dr. David Hofmann is an Associate Professor of Sociology and the Director of the Criminology and Criminal Justice Program at the University of New Brunswick Fredericton Campus. He is a nationally-rec-ognized expert on far-right extremism and violence, and has extensive experience conducting funded research in this area with governmental partners such as Public Safety Canada, National Defense, and Defense Research and Development Canada. He is the co-lead on the multi-year government funded Network for Research on Hateful Conduct and Right-Wing Extremism in the Canadian Armed Forces which is studying the breadth, depth, and extent of far-right worldviews and ideologies in the Canadian military. David is also a research fellow with the Grego Centre for the Study of War and Society. David's current research intersts are focused on five broad areas: terrorism and political violence, charismatic leadership, right-wing extremism, apocalyptial and millenarian groups, and criminal. David is a mixed methodologist, with a particular interest in social network analysis. Given the culture of toxic masculinity that often goes hand-in-hand with groups and individuals involved in right-winged extremist groups, it is an environment where Intimate Partner Violence/ gendered violence is likely to thrive. David is interested in incorporating an exploration of the relationship between right-wing extremism and IPV/gender violence into his research.

Dr. Diane Crocker is a Professor and Chair in the Department of Criminology at Saint Mary's University in Halifax. Diane's research focuses on gender-based violence and restorative justice. In recent years most of her research has addressed campus sexual violence policies and domestic violence prevention.

Dr. Evie Tastsouglou is a Professor at the Department of Sociology, cross-appointed to the International Development Studies Program at Saint Mary's University in Halifax, Nova Scotia. With sociological and legal training Dr. Tastsoglou has over twenty five years of expertise in working with gender and immigrant women in Canada and internationally. As founder and leader of the Gender Domain of the Atlantic Metropolis Centre of Excellence (2003-2013) she led multiple projects on various aspects of migration with a gender-based and intersectional analysis. Past Chair of her Department (2006-2012), President Elect and subsequently President of the RC 32 ("Women in Society") of the International Sociological Association (2006-2014), member of the ISA Executive Committee and Research Council (2014-2018), and current President of the Canadian Ethnic Studies Association, she focuses her research on sexual and gender based violence and precarity during forced migration.

Dr. Tastsouglou is currently the Principle Investigator on the GBV-MIG Canada Research Team Project: Violence Against Women Migrants and Refugees: Analyzing Causes and Effective Policy Response

Dr. Karla O'Regan is an Associate Professor of Crim-inology at St. Thomas University and a part-time lecturer in the Faculty of Law at UNB. A graduate of St. Thomas University, Karla has law degrees from the University of Toronto, Dalhousie University, and the London School of Economics. She is a member of the Law Society of Upper Canada and has worked for the Federal Department of Justice, Ontario's Office of the Children's Lawyer, and private legal sectro.

Dr. O'Regan is the research lead of the Atlantic region for the Awarness to Action Porject.

Dr. Laura Winters is now CEO of Stella's Circle in St. John's, NL, which provides services to adults who face barriers to fully participate in their community including mental health challenges, addictions, trauma, poverty, homelessness criminal justice involvement, low literacy and unemployment. Their services include a residential counselling program, a housing resources centre, a women's centre, and a social enterprise training program. Stella's Circle is in the process of developing 15 units of transitional housing for women, prioritizing women experiencing homelessness who have histories of criminal justice involvement and/or experiences of violence. They also participated in the recent premiere's roundtable on gender equity and have engaged with the province's consultations on the Interpersonal Violence Disclosure Protocol Act.

Dr. Lucia O'Sullivan is a social psychologist and Professor in the Department of Psychology at the University of New Brunswick. She is also the director of the Sex and Relationships Lab. Her work focuses primarily on sexual health, intimate relationships, and the affective and cognitive components of sexual decision-making of young adults and adolescents. She held a Canada Research Chair in Adolescents' Sexual Health Behaviour (2006-2016) and has received a wide range of funding from federal agencies (e.g., NIH, CIHR, SSHRC) and private foundations (e.g., Ford, NBHRF) to support her work. Other studies address the development, maintenance, and breakup of intimate relationships, as well as the role of gender in romantic and sexual experiences. Dr. O'Sullivans research program frequently incorporates studies and collaborations that are international (e.g., South Africa, Guatemala, India, US, UK) and interdisciplinary.

D. O'Sullivan is Principle Investigator on the project: Identifying Scripts and Norms Guiding Young Men's Use of Sexual Aggression Against Women.

Dr. Mayme Lefurgey holds a Ph.D. in Gender, Sexuality & Women's Studies (collaborative program in Transitional Justice & Post-Conflict Recconstruction) from Western University. Mayme's doctoral research explored trauma-informed, relation-al and embodied approaches to addressing violence—including wartime violence, structural/systemic violence, family violence and gender-based violence in post-conflict Colombia in collaboration with the non-profit peacebuilding organization Dunna.

Mayme is UNB's Purdy Crawford/TD Bank Fellow in Accessibility (2021-2023)—a fellowship that supports applied research with immediate public policy relevance and impact on the lives of New Brunswickers. Her research considers the urgent need to understand how different forms of inequality intersect with and interact within the socio-political and economic contexts in New Brunswick.

More precisely, her postdoctoral work considers the need to understand how the COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated and altered existing barriers for women and gender-diverse people who are accessing services and supports related to intimate partner violence and gender-based violence in the province.

Dr. Linda Neilson is a Professor Emerita at UNB. Linda is a lawyer and a recognized academic authority on legal systems and family violence. Throughout her career, Linda's research has been devoted to legal system analysis and reform. Major works include, on behalf of the National Judicial Institute, three editions of a domestic violence bench book for Canadian Judges and, more recently, Responding to Domestic Violence in Family Law, Civil Protection and Child Protection Cases, published by the Canadian Legal Information Institute on the same topic. She is coeditor of Ending Gender-Based Violence (Captus Press, 2023). Her 2023 Family violence Family law brief (EN; FR) examines social and institutional barriers in the legal system that prevent access to justice. She is the author of Parental Alienation Empirical Analysis: Child Best Interests or Parental Rights? (FREDA) and co-author, with Susan Boyd, of Interpreting the New Divorce Act, Rules of Statutory Interpretation and Senate Observations (FREDA and LEAF websites. Refer to LEAF for the document in French). She is author of a report on responding to family violence cases in multiple court systems from a family law perspective published by Justice Canada (ENG, FR). She was co-principal investigator (with Joanne Boucher) and with Justice Robichaud and Judge Dugas-Horsman of the Coordinated Provincial/Queen's Bench Family Violence Court Model project. Final Report: EN FR. In addition, she was the lead author of the (2019) Collective Memo of Concern to the World Health Organization on parental alienation endorsed by experts from 26 countries. In 2021 and 2022 she was the recipient of national and provincial awards for her work in the family violence field. She is a member of an international research team (led by Dr. Simon Lapierre, University of Ottawa). She initiated the formation of an international association of experts (Australia, Brazil, Canada, France, Germany, Israel, Italy, Netherlands, New Zealand, United Kingdom, United States) conducting research on family law issues associated with parental alienation concepts. Her academic work is cited by the United Nations Special Rapporteur in the (2023) violence against women and children report delivered to UN Human Rights Council (ENG, FR).

Dr. MaryAnn Campbell (Ph.D. Dalhousie) is a Full Professor in the Psychology Department at the Saint John Campus of the University of New Brunswick. Her main area of research focuses on deveoping and enhancing the application of evidence-based strategies for crime prevention and reduction. To date, Dr. Campbell's research has included the study of criminal behaviour committed by adults, youths, and and special populations (e.g., persons with mental health issues); understadning the psycopathic personality through its measurement in offenders and general populations; enhancing positive outcomes for justice-involved youth through evidence-based practice; and the evaluation of intervention programs aimed at crime prevention and risk reduction goals (e.g., mental health courts, chronic offender interventions, drug-treatment programs). Another related area of interest pertains to police psychology. Dr. Campbell has been involved in projects evaluating the implementation of intelligence-led policing, application of community policing principles, and the enhancement of best practices in police work (e.g., police responses to intimate partner violence, credibility assessment methods).

Dr. Campbell is the Principle Investigator for the Centre for Criminal Justice Studies & Policing Research – among other criminal justice topics. Her research centre has various projects on I PV-related themes:

- a) Celia Project Common language for Evidence-based policing and Levels of risk in IPV Assessment (SSHRC funded, PI Dr. Zoe Hilton) She is a co-investigator on this project and coordinate the NB site involved in this project.
- b) Police Views of the ODARA a qualitative study examining police officers' views of risk assessment tool for appraising risk of IPV on the frontline in their calls for service led my Amy MacQuarrie, PhD Student, UNB Saint John Psychology (supervisor on this project)
- c) Police response to IPV and its association with violence risk mitigation
- d) Assessing the properties of a psychopathic-borderline personality trait-based risk assessment tool for the prediction of IPV and severity of IPV behaviours based on police records.

Dr. Mary Aspinall is an Assistant Professor at St. Thomas University. Her research interests are intimate partner violence and therapeutic jurisprudence. She previously worked at the YWCA Isabel Johnson women's shelter, and as a Domestic Violence Victim Caseworker at Family Service Regina. She also served as a

panel member for the Saskatchewan Domestic Violence Death Review until her relocation to New Brunswick.

Dr. Aspinall is the Project Coordinator for the Awarness to Action (A2A) Project.

Dr. Petrea Taylor is an Assistant Professor with the Faculty of Nursing (FON), UNB. Her program of research is gender, violence, and health, with a particular interest in women's mental health, suicidal-ity, and stigma. While working as a clinical nurse specialist in Addictions and Mental Health, Horizon Health Network, Petrea completed (2018) with an Interdisciplinary PhD (Nursing, Sociology, Philosophy). Upon graduating, Petrea accepted a post-doctoral fellowship with supervisor Dr. Kelly Scott-Storey as a post-doctoral fellow funded by CIHR on a Men's Gender Violence and Health Study (MGVHS). In January 2020, Petrea was hired with the FON Accelerated Program at the UNB Moncton site in her hometown.

Dr. Taylor is a Co-Investigator on the project: Variation in Men's Health by Cumulative Lifetime Violence Severity and Social Determinants of Health: A Longitudinal Exploratory Study.

Dr. Kim Dubé is an assistant professor in the Department of Sociology and Criminology at the Université de Moncton, Moncton campus. A fervent intersectional feminist, queer Acadian woman and activist at heart, she is interested in the various forms of gender-based violence, particularly sexual violence in sports settings, as well as violence against older women and 2SLGBTQIA+ communities. She is a research fellow at the Muriel McQueen Ferguson Centre, an affiliated member of the Chaire de recherche violences sexistes et sexuelles en milieu d'enseignement supérieur [VSSMES] and a collaborating member of the Collectif de recherche et d'action sur la sécurité, autonomie et la santé des femmes [SAS-Femmes]. She also collaborates on research with Alter Acadie and is a proud member of the board of directors of the Regroupement féministe du Nouveau-Brunswick [RFNB] and GRIS Acadie.

Dr. Katie Aubrecht is Canada Research Chair Health Equity and Social Justice, and Associate Professor of Sociology at St. Francis Xavier University in Antigonish, Nova Scotia. Aubrecht's action-oriented research program uses sociological theory, qualitative research methods and an intersectional analytical approach to analyze violence in health and social care services and supports in community, educational and residential care policies and practices. This program of work is supported by the Spatializing Care: Intersectional Disability Studies Lab, a transdisciplinary health and disability policy research and training infrastructure.
